

Dear Students and Parent/Carers,

RE: Year II English Assessment Point Information and Take-Home Sheet

We would like to congratulate our Year II English classes on the positive and focused approach to their first half-term in Year II. They have worked hard on understanding the Reading and Writing skills that they will need to demonstrate in their English Language exams and have completed a number of practice questions in assessment conditions.

At the end of Year 11, students will sit examinations for two GCSEs Qualifications in English: English Literature and English Language. These are separate GCSEs and the highest grade will count as students' Core English GCSE Grade. I have included all details of these examinations as an attachment and also included a "Take Home Worksheet" for this Autumn Term.

Assessment Points throughout Year 11 will keep you informed of your child's current 'Working At Grades' in English Language and English Literature as well as their Attitude to Learning in English. Prior to Assessment Point I this Autumn, students have been completing English Language practice questions; these will help to inform their 'Working At Grade' for English Language but we will also consider how students were able to respond to extended English assessments in their Summer 2023 English Literature Pre-Public Exams. The most accurate 'Working At Grades' for students in English Literature are based on what they achieved in their Pre-Public Exams in Summer 2023 and so these will remain the same. Prior to Assessment Point 2 this Winter, students will complete English Literature practice questions; this will be an opportunity to assess the progress they have made with in English Literature. After Assessment Points, students will be bringing a Reflection Sheet home; this is an opportunity for students to reflect on their assessments in English and how they can make progress towards their GCSE examinations – we appreciate your support and time in completing this sheet with your child.

<u>Students are welcome to join us in CO10 for English Language and Literature GCSE Study</u> <u>every Thursday (week 1) from 3:10-4:10pm.</u> Additionally, if you feel your child would benefit from some English intervention during tutor time please raise this with me or member of the English Department.

I have attached a Take-Home sheet with details of the Year II English Curriculum for this term. In addition to homework set by class teachers, there are more independent revision tasks to help students to revise at home (take-home tasks). Details of these tasks will be shared with students in lessons with resources on TEAMs. Please let us know if you want printed copies of any of the resources.





The take-home sheet also has details of our memorable moments for the term in English: Super Starts, Marvellous Middles, Fantastic Finishes. In lessons before half-term we will launch our English Literature Quotation Bee Competition. After half-term, we will be launching our competition to creative thematic representations of the Power and Conflict collection.

English Language GCSE

Paper 1 - Thursday 23rd May am - 1 hr 45 mins

Creative Texts

Section A: Reading (1 hour)

You will be given a creative text to read.

You will be asked to answer 4 questions based on the text.

Section B: Writing (45 minutes)

You will be asked to do a piece of creative writing based on a stimulus. The stimulus may be an image, a short piece of writing or a scenario.

Paper 2 - Thursday 6th June, am-1 hr 45min

Writers' Viewpoints

Section A: Reading (1 hour)

You will be given two non-fiction texts to read.

You will be asked to answer 4 questions based on these texts.

Section B: Writing (45 minutes)

You will be asked to write a non-fiction text, presenting a viewpoint.

<u>These are skills-based exams this means that to prepare for the exams you have to practice.</u>

Any Reading and Writing (skill practice) you do will help improve your skill level. However, if you practice the particular questions for each of the papers time and time again then you will give yourself the advantage of knowing exactly how to use your skills to best effect.

The key thing is you have to practice – it's not a case of learning information.

- You will be asked to answer **4 questions** based on the text.




Reading: 5 minutes

Question 1: 5 minutes

4 marks: Find 4 things. Check the **question focus** Check you are referring the **correct lines** Make you points **focused and specific**



Question 2: 10 minutes

8 marks: analyse language Use the phrase 'The writer uses...' and PEE Avoid empty analysis



Question 3: 15 minutes

8 marks: analyse structure Read the whole source Use the 3 bullet points and the sentence stems



Question 4: 25 minutes


20 marks: PROVE and DEVELOP the interpretation Use the phrase **'The writer uses...'** and **PEE** Avoid empty analysis


<u>Paper 2 (Writers' Viewpoints)</u> Section A – 1 Hour

- You will be given two non-fiction texts to read.
- You will be asked to answer **4 questions** based on these texts.











Reading: 5 minutes

Read the questions, the information and texts. Reading Questions 2 and 4 will ensure that you don't misinterpret the texts.

Question 1: 5 minutes

1 source. 4 marks: Identify **4 True statements** Identify whether each statement is True or False **Shade in the circles** of the 4 True Statements

Question 3: 15 minutes

1 source. 12 marks: analyse l**anguage** Use the phrase **'The writer uses...'** and **PEE** Avoid empty analysis


Question 2: 15 minutes

Both sources - 8 marks: make **inferences** Base your inferences on the **question focus Summarise the similarities or differences** between the texts.

Question 4: 20 minutes

Both sources - 16 marks: compare how writers present viewpoints. Think about the writers' viewpoints Use the phrase 'The writer uses...' and PEE Use comparison connectives

<u>Section B: Writing</u> (45 mins)



The Assessment Criteria Writing

In order to ensure that you meet the assessment criteria, you should focus on the following:

- Write in focused and <u>well-structured paragraphs</u> Plan: think about your ideas and organising your writing
- Creating an engaging style of your writing Think about the style and overall effect of your writing
- Use a **variety of vocabulary, writing techniques and sentence types** Think about the effect of your language
- Check that your writing is clear and <u>accurate</u>.
 Do your sentences make sense?

Paper 1 , Section B - Creative Writing

(narrative or description) with an image stimulus You must show that you can present creative details with your language and create a change of tone.

Planning Structure

- 1. Atmosphere/ earlier (opposite of Stage 3)
- 2. Zoom in / focus
- 3. Change (opposite of Stage 1)
- 4. Impact

Paper 2, Section B - Writing a viewpoint

A formal opinion piece with a statement as a stimulus You must show that you can engage your readers.

Writing a Viewpoint Structure

- Introduction to topic (statement) and viewpoint
- Attention Getter relate the topic to your reader
- Main Body 3-5 planned points to develop your viewpoint
- Conclusion summarise your viewpoint and appeal to your reader

English Literature GCSE

Paper 1 – 'Macbeth' and 'A Christmas Carol': Monday 13th May am – 1 Hour, 45 minutes

Section A: Shakespeare- 'Macbeth' – 34 marks (55 mins)

You will be given a short extract from 'Macbeth'.

You will be asked to answer a question about a character or theme in the extract. You will need to write about the character or theme in the whole play. There are 4 marks for spelling, punctuation and grammar.

Section B: The 19th-century novel –<u>'A Christmas Carol'</u> - 30 marks (50 mins)

You will be given a short extract from 'A Christmas Carol'. You will be asked to answer a question about a character or theme in the extract. You will need to write about the character or theme in the whole novel.

Paper 2 – 'An Inspector Calls' and Poetry:

Monday 20th May am – 2 hours, 15 minutes

Section A: Modern texts: 'An Inspector Calls' - 34 marks

Answer one of the 'An Inspector Calls' essay questions. Use as many details from the play as you can.

Section B: Anthology Poetry: 'Power and Conflict' – 30 marks

You will be given a copy of one of the poems and asked to compare it to one of the other poems from 'Power and Conflict'.

Section C: Unseen poetry – 32 marks

You will be asked to read two poems. You will need to answer two questions. Firstly, you will be asked to analyse the first poem. Secondly, you will then be asked to compare the two poems.

English Literature Paper 1: Shakespeare and the 19th Century Novel

Section A: Shakespeare- <u>'Macbeth'</u> – 34 marks (55 mins) You will be given a short extract from 'Macbeth'. You will be asked to answer a question about a character or theme in the extract. You will need to write about the character or theme in the whole play. There are 4 marks for spelling, punctuation and grammar.

Section B: The 19th-century novel - 'A Christmas Carol' - 30 marks (50 mins) You will be given a short extract from 'A Christmas Carol'.

You will be asked to answer a question about a character or theme in the extract. You will need to write about the character or theme in the whole novel.

Both questions have extracts. Approach both Questions in the same way.



Shakespeare's tragedy 'Macbeth' is a play about a tragic hero with a fatal flaw who, inspired by, witchcraft and evil influences, commits treason (linking to the 1605 Gunpowder Plot) leading to his downfall.



Dickens' story of **Christian** redemption set in the context of 19th Century London at Christmas. With elements of gothic, it is the **Ghostly Spirits** of Christmas Past, Present and Future that show the miserly Scrooge the error of his ways and the misery caused by want and ignorance in society.

English Literature Paper 2: Modern Texts and Poetry

Section A: Modern texts: <u>'An Inspector Calls'</u> – 34 marks

Answer one of the 'An Inspector Calls' essay questions. Use as many details from the play as you can.

Section B: Anthology Poetry: 'Power and Conflict' – 30 marks

You will be given a copy of one of the poems and asked to compare it to one of the other poems from 'Power and Conflict'.

Section C: Unseen poetry – 32 marks

Skills based question responding to poems you have not studied

You will be asked to read two poems. You will need to answer two questions.

Firstly, you will be asked to analyse the first poem. Secondly, you will then be asked to compare the two poems.



Priestley uses 'An Inspector Calls' as a morality play to deliver his socialist message, highlighting the cruelty and inequality in the patriarchal and rigidly class-structured pre-war society. An inverted whodunnit in which one-by-one the family are shown their role in the 'chain of events' leading to the suicide of Eva Smith.
